## Letter from the Rectory - Listening to the Voice of Creation Rev Jeff

From $1^{\text {st }}$ September to $4^{\text {th }}$ October, we celebrate Creation tide. This formalises the time when for many years we give thanks to God for our food in our harvest thanksgiving services.

## Our harvest services this year are:

-Friday $16^{\text {th }}$ September at 6:30pm at Horsehouse Church
-Sunday $18^{\text {th }}$ September at 11am at Thornton Steward Church
-Sunday $25^{\text {th }}$ September at 3 pm in Middleham Community Garden
-Friday $7^{\text {th }}$ October at 7pm in East Witton Church
As the impacts of climate change increase it is a good opportunity to think about how dependent we are on creation and how to look after it. Psalm 19 says:

The heavens are telling the glory of God, and the firmament proclaims his handiwork.
${ }^{2}$ Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge.
${ }^{3}$ There is no speech, nor are there words; their voice is not heard;
${ }^{4}$ yet their voice goes out through all the earth and their words to the end of the world.

The theme of Creation tide this year is 'Listening to the Voice of Creation.'I wonder what the voice of creation is saying? Maybe it screams in pain at being burned. Maybe its cries are drowned out in floods.


It is easy for us to feel powerless and anxious in the face of climate change. It is a complex issue and sometimes it feels like you can't do right for doing wrong. Therefore, here are some tips to help you get to grips with the biggest emissions in our lives.

In order to calculate your carbon footprint, Liz and I use Climate Stewards, https://www.climatestewards.org/offset/ It is easy to use and translates your litres of oil, for example, into tonnes of carbon dioxide and translates that into cash at $£ 20$ per tonne which you can then donate via their website to projects which take that amount of carbon out of the atmosphere. Their projects have an independent Seal of Approval which verifies that they do what they claim because there has been adverse press about rogue projects.

For Liz and $\mathrm{I}, 90 \%$ of our emissions come from two sources, the heating oil and car diesel. Targeting these two is a good place to start.

If you can improve your home insulation or turn down the thermostat a degree or two (without jeopardising your health) then you're making a difference. For example, 3,000 litres
of oil produces over 11 tonnes of carbon and costs $£ 232$ to offset. This is a lot but as a portion of the cost of the oil much less and reflects the true cost of oil. As a nation we aim to be carbon net zero by 2050 so offset a portion for now and build up over the years.

If you can reduce car journeys or hypermile i.e. driving as economically as you can it makes a difference. I recently did a 100 mile journey largely on the A1 and found that cruising at 56 mph . achieved a $40 \%$ reduction in fuel use.

Switching your electricity to a renewable energy tariff is another quick win.
If we do these things then maybe we can turn creation's cries of pain into songs of joy.

# Tracy and the Great North Run - for her brother 

You might have seen Tracy Bowe delivering the post locally. With her job, she walks about 10 miles a day, but she has taken up the challenge of tackling The Great North Run on Sunday $11^{\text {th }}$ September, in support of her brother who was given months to live after an incurable brain tumour diagnosis.

She will be running to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support because of the help the charity has given her brother, Paul. Paul, who lives in Darlington, was diagnosed with incurable brain tumours in 2021.

Tracy said: 'Our brother was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer in November 2021 at the age of just 43. This has shocked our family to the core. Unsure of where to turn to, what to do, Macmillan Cancer Support have been there for him right from the start. This is our way to give something back.
"My sister Leanne and I will be running together, we wanted to do something for Paul so he can see what he means to us, I want him there on the finish line in South Shields waiting with a bottle of wine."

The Future of the Key Centre, Middleham
The Key Centre Trustees have made the following statement:
Earlier this year, after the Key Centre Trustee Board stood down, 5 Town Councillors came forward to ensure continuity. The initial priority for the new trustees has been to carry out a business review and, whilst this is not yet complete, it has become clear that following Covid, demand for business office space in rural areas and use by community groups has significantly reduced. As things stand, the Key Centre spends more money than it currently earns and whilst, fortunately, there are no debts, this position is clearly unsustainable and at some point funds may run out.

The Trustees have successfully renegotiated contracts to reduce outgoings and continue to let function rooms to residents and others alongside our current regular groups. A more radical solution however is required to ensure longer term viability and the Trustees and Council are exploring all options, including potential for sharing use of the building. These investigations are at an early stage - please be reassured that the aim is that these will continue to include a community space, albeit a smaller and hopefully more sustainable one.

The Key Centre is Middleham's community centre. Council and the trustees intend to share their thoughts and plans and seek feedback from residents, current user groups and potential users. Feedback may be sought in the form of a questionnaire. It is also planned to organise a town meeting; many residents will remember the very well-attended public meeting 5 years ago to discuss the future of the playing fields which led to a rejuvenated Sports and Community Wellbeing Association.
Further announcements will be made when there is more to report and the Trustees and Council are in a position to recommend a plan.

In the meantime, the Key Centre is mostly run by volunteers: are you able to give up some of your time to, for example, maintain the front garden, help with laying out chairs and tables for events? John's Gospel captures the amazing truth: 'And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us'. Jesus came and lived on earth in 'time and place'. He stepped into 'our world' so that we can step into his.

But those were different times, and different places, and with people who lived in a very different culture. Indeed in 30 AD people who lived in what we describe as 'The Holy Land' lived in a wide range of contrasting cultural and geographical settings. If we are to gain best insight from a study of the Gospels we need to get to grips with the context in which Jesus was immersed.
'World of Jesus' will offer an opportunity to explore these things over eight sessions. Drawing from scripture, other contemporary writings, and extensive archaeological evidence, we'll gain a better grasp of the social, political and geographical context of Jesus' ministry. Not only will this be fascinating, it will also enable the scriptures to come alive - indeed 'the Word will be made Flesh' afresh for God's people today.

## Bird notes from Richard Wells

It's not often that Wensleydale writes itself into the ornithological history books. So news that a pair of ospreys (r) have raised two young on the Bolton Estate is a delight.

They are the first known pair of ospreys ever to have bred in Yorkshire and records go back into the $18^{\text {th }}$ century.

Even in our parishes we can share in the joy.
The adults passed over our patch on many occasions during the summer while hunting for fish, first for themselves and later for their growing son and daughter. I saw one languidly flying over Braithwaite Moor one morning, no doubt on its way to Leighton Reservoir to catch the family lunch. Nosterfield Nature Reserve was another fish restaurant that was visited and I suspect that Thornton Steward was too, though I never heard of one being seen there.

In fact it has been a summer for birds of prey. A pair of hen harriers raised one young on one of our moors and a pair of hobby spent much of the summer near the River Ure in the Jervaulx/Thornton Steward area. Flashy, dashing falcons
 capable of catching sand martins and even dragonflies on the wing. (See right). I strongly suspect that they have bred also, but I cannot be sure. If they have, that would be a first for the area too.

What could be less good news is the status of our swift (left) population. The birds left incredibly early, in July rather than their usual mid-August, which I have never known in my 30-plus years living here. Why I have no idea. And did they actually fledge their young before leaving or was it a blank breeding season? We can only hope they return in the same numbers in 2023.

## Biodiversity in the Churchyard

## Harebells - Campanula rotundifolia



You may have seen the harebells in Middleham churchyard this year. One or two appeared in our 'protected' areas last year, but this year they have multiplied.
Harebells are a delicate flower, light blue in colour, and flower between July and September - preferring undisturbed ground, and tolerating dry conditions.
They are regularly visited by bumblebees and honeybees, providing a good source of nectar for these insects.
In Scotland, the harebell is sometimes known simply as the 'bluebell' and it is this flower that appears on Scottish bluebell matches (see below).

Elsewhere, the harebell has picked up various local names, including 'witches' thimbles' and 'fairy bells' and 'cuckoo's shoe' and in days gone by they had a strong connection to fairy folklore.


In the past in Scotland, harebells were used to produce a blue dye for tartan.


Today, some people add the flowers to a salad.


## Future of Bridge

The Bridge has been a wonderful communication tool for the churches and communities in our parish for many years, containing local information and a showcase for local events and news stories.

With the pandemic in 2019, a change in format from paper to email version was the only way the information could continue to be distributed and Liz has worked very hard in editing and circulating the email version to an ever-growing list of community members. Liz decided in April that it was time to step away from this role with effect from the end of the year, and so we are in NEED OF A NEW EDITOR.
If you are interested in this (voluntary) role, please contact Liz (details at the end of Bridge) and she will be able to tell you more about what it entails. Briefly, you need to be able to have a PC, be able to use Word or Publisher, have 15-20 hours a month available, have a creative eye for layout, and be able to work to a deadline. We will need to hear from you by the end of August so that a transition period can begin in September, with the new editor taking on the role fully from January 2023. Should we be unable to find a new editor, we regret to say that the December2022/ January 2023 issue will be the last edition.
Should an editor come forward, and we are able to continue, we have also been considering the viability of reinstating a hard copy version of the Bridge to be delivered to each household. The costs and logistics of producing Bridge in paper format are enormous and rely on many hours of volunteers' time. Costs of production are rising all the time and volunteers are becoming increasingly hard to come by, so the workload for the handful left is just too onerous. After much research and discussion, it has finally been decided that, if Bridge continues, as from the February 2023 edition, Bridge will be distributed solely in an online version.
We realise that this will come as a blow to those who would prefer to have a hard copy, but we will ensure that the printing facility of the email version is straight forward so that it can easily be printed at home. For those who do not have a printer at home or access to a computer, we would urge to you to ask a friend or neighbour to print it for you.
For those who do have printers we would ask you to please consider printing out a copy for anyone you know who finds accessing technology difficult as some people find it hard to ask. Or if you already print the online version at home, perhaps you could pass it on to someone else after you have finished with it? That way we can spread the task of distributing the Bridge among the whole community.
We thank you for your understanding and cooperation. We would also like to thank the team of volunteers who over years have helped to produce and distribute the paper version and hopefully this publication can continue, albeit in a different format.
